

NOTICE OF REFERENDUM

**Town of Cary
November 8, 2022**

Referendum Election Details

At an election to be held in the Town of Cary, on November 8, 2022 the following proposed Resolution of the Town Board, will be submitted to a vote of the people:

The Town Board of the Town of Cary, Wood County, Wisconsin, does hereby ordain as follows:

That, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 60.30(1e) (a), the office of the Town Clerk and Town Treasurer, shall be filled by appointment of a majority of the members-elect of the town board.

The term of office for the appointed position(s) shall be set by the town board, but may not exceed 3 years per § 60.30(1e) (c). The town board may re-appoint the officer(s) for additional terms. However, removal by the town board during a given term of office may only be for “cause” as defined under § 17.001 and required by § 60.30(1e) (f).

This ordinance is subject to approval by the town electors in a referendum, which is hereby called by the Town Board to be held on November 8, 2022. The referendum question(s) shall be:

“Shall the person holding the office of Town Clerk and Town Treasurer in the Town of Cary be appointed by the town board?”

The salary of the appointed position(s) shall be set by the town board and may not be reduced during the term of office.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its town board passage, notice after passage per § 60.80 and also its referendum approval by the town electors as required by § 60.30(1e) (b).

Ballot Text

The question will appear on the ballot as follows:

“Shall the person holding the office of Town Clerk and Town Treasurer in the Town of Cary be appointed by the town board?”

Explanation

A “YES” vote means you are in favor of the appointment of the clerk and treasurer. A “NO” vote means you are not in favor of appointing a clerk and treasurer and they should remain elected.
